In advance of National Indigenous History Month which takes place in June, the Canadian Teachers' Federation (CTF/FCE) is sharing resources for teachers to integrate in the classroom and for students to learn more about First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples in Canada.

Canadian Geographic Education offers free, bilingual resources from kindergarten to grade 12. The Royal Canadian Geographical Society, Canadian Geographic, and Canadian Geographic Education have collaborated with Indigenous partners and storytellers to produce content and educational resources that reflect the experiences and knowledge of the Indigenous Peoples of Canada.

The organization provides literacy in First Nations elementary schools, entrepreneurship at the high school level, and mentorship for students to pursue post-secondary education. They also offer a virtual library for educators to explore learning materials and research reports.
